A. PREFACE

THE FOREWORD

The number of women scholars in higher education is continue to increase due to numerous institutes are accessible to them. Ramabai Government Mahila Post Graduate College is one of the higher educational institute provides better learning opportunities to the women scholars of Ambedkar Nagar district and adjacent areas. College was established in 1997 with the aim to deliver best educational facilities to the admitted scholars/ students to enhance their knowledge and temperament. College is fully government owned and managed, this status ensures maximum substructure, academic quality, best faculty appointment and scholar oriented policies for their future prospects. This college was assessed and accredited by NAAC (National Assessment and Accreditation Council) in April 2011 and awarded with 'B' grade; it was a good secured grade among other accredited government and aided degree colleges in Uttar Pradesh.

It is permanently affiliated with Dr. Ram Manohar Lohia Avadh University, Faizabad for course work and programs. College offers Under Graduate (UG) programs/ courses in Arts/ Social Sciences, Commerce and Science. The Post Graduate (PG) programs/ courses are available in five subjects of Arts/ Social Sciences. The location of this college has been demarcated recently, and now it is located in the urban segment, close to the district headquarter.

College provides accurate academic opportunities to rural and urban students, those wish to join this college after screening. During the admission process, the needy student gets financial assistance, counselling and faculty support. The socially marginalized students get special attention by the Student Welfare Committee (SWC) as well. The dropout rate at this institute is lesser in comparison to other higher learning educational institutes nearby. The use of Information and Communication Technology (ICT) is essential for the global competitiveness; accordingly, this college has adopted the digitalization process to focus mainly on quality education, accessible to all UG and PG scholars. The Wi-Fi campus passes opportunities to the UG and PG scholars to use the modern techniques for studies.

The online books (both Hindi and English medium), journals and magazines are available in the central/ main library for students, faculty and staff members. In addition to IGNOU center, the EDUSAT is installed in the college premises for distant learning facility for students. Furthermore, in the previous academic session, paying the fee directly to the bank account (college account) for cashless procedure was initiated, which helps the students to get single window of admission facilities.

Beside class lectures, the tradition of debates, discussions, talks and group based learning is present in the college since its establishment and now developed as a part of academic culture. The national seminars, symposiums and conferences are organized for better understanding of themes and contemporary/relevant issues in Social Sciences, Humanities, Sciences and Commerce. The departmental seminars, lecture series and industrial interactions (for

commerce stream) are the part of academic curriculum of this college, this not only provide higher learning chances to UG and PG students, though, these activities increase the academic excellence as well. The external evaluation process is entirely managed by the affiliated university, however, the internal evaluation of students i.e. viva-voce, assignments, practical exams, tutorials, debates, performance in class and essay competitions are conducted by the departmental council/ committees of this college. Moreover, the departmental council (represented by students) plays a significant role in managing the categorical academic and extracurricular activities.

Student freedom for debates, queries, curricular and extra-curricular activities (ECA) are encouraged by the head/ principal and faculty members of this college. A student friendly campus is one of the major ethical component of learning of this college. Sport, cultural, NSS, Ranger events and practice of Yoga are organized in the college, which increase the personality development both psychologically and socially.

The students of this college contribute to the society through their volunteering services i.e. campaign against all social ills, drugs, female feticide, child marriage, dowry, communalism, casteism regionalism etc. The social awareness drives are the part of the prospectus of this college. The campaign for improve literacy rate, voter registration, 'vote to strengthen democracy', women rights, equality, protect human dignity and protection of environment are the major themes on which our students participates devotedly.

Environment protection is the foremost concern of this college in the period of fast altering atmosphere. Students, faculty and staff members participates in tree plantation on national holidays. Spacious botanical gardens are nurtured by the students from Department of Botany, NSS, Ranger units. A Water Harvesting small pool/ area is sited in the college campus for the collection of rainwater.

The well-organized basic and specific facilities are the backbone of this college. Clean drinking water, quite a lot of rest rooms, reading room, computer lab, library automation, multi-purpose open space, sprawling campus, cycle and vehicle parking, extra PG classrooms (funded by RUSA) and well-equipped laboratories are available in the college. The Close Circuit Television (CCTV) has been fitted in the college for the security of campus and students. These facilities increase the academic ether inside the college precinct.

The regular parent-faculty, student-faculty, alumni, stakeholder meets are organized to get the feedback on academic eminence and suggestions for infrastructure improvement in the college. Nonetheless, annual feedback is also collected from the students to improve the academic quality in the college. Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) monitors all the academic and non-academic activities of the colleges, and this cell ensures the applicable quality maintenance as well. The process of NAAC, Cycle-II was initiated by IQAC in January-February 2016, and the preparation of Self-Study Report (SSR) was started before the expiration of previous/first accredited grade.

Various other committees i.e. gender sensitization, student welfare, ICT committee for intense digitalization, environment protection, grievance and redressal, finance, book purchase and campus beautification, anti-ragging and sport committee are formed to uphold the academic

standard of this college. Additionally, the limited financial resources, little less classrooms, lack of large auditorium, non-appointment of faculties timely from government, higher facultystudent ratio and low students enrollment due to the other newly opened higher learning selffinance institutes nearby, are the major obstructions for this government postgraduate college. Even so, 'deliver better' in the academic arena, is the foremost objective and mission of this college, which would continue in the future.

B. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Education, especially in the rural areas of Uttar Pradesh (UP) has been improved progressively. The enrollment of students in the educational institutions is continuously increasing in every academic session. Ramabai Government Mahila Post Graduate College of Akbarpur, Ambedkar Nagar is one of the few government managed institute in UP, which is explicitly established for girls/ women scholars. The college has been established in June 1997 in rental building; however, few years later its own permanent building has been erected at adjoining Akbarpur city.

The total strength of the student is more than eight hundred. Large number of rural and underprivileged students enroll themselves in this government college; the enrollment covers every section of the society. However, the admission to the various available programs has been opened both for the rural and urban students. College offers various courses at the Under Graduate (UG) and Post Graduate (PG) level. There are 16 departments, which covers the major streams of higher education. Arts/ Humanities/ Social Sciences, Sciences, Commerce, Music and Physical Education (sport activities) is being taught at graduate level, and PG programs covers mainly the Art/ Social Science streams.

As far as the curricular characteristics is concern, **c**ollege is government managed higher education institute affiliated by the state university. It follows the course work and evaluation process directed by the university. College perform the certain evaluative practices for the internal evaluation. The yearly feedback from students and stakeholders are utilized for assessment of the course, teaching, faculty and infrastructures available in college. Faculty members send suggestions on feedback to the parent University for change in course design. The classroom lecture using ICT and discussions including tutorials is the prominent methods used by this college. Research work is not available in this college, though faculties has send their proposals for research work and the sanction is pending with the university.

However, faculties of this college are engaged in writing and publishing their research work in various reputed journals and magazines. Faculties have participated in numerous training programs (Orientation and Refresher, Summer-Winter courses, capacity building) organized by different agencies (UGC, ICSSR). All the faculty members are the part of *Uttar Pradesh Rajkiya Degree College Academic Society*, which hold the academic programs like- national seminars, international conference and symposiums annually. The consultancy services are provided by few faculties to various other agencies whenever the requirement is pursued, and the collaborations with various other departments in central and state universities are maintained by this college for academic partnership.

All the basic infrastructure facilities are available in the college that enhance the academic quality. The better classroom facility with ICT enabled lectures are the academic part of this college, the EDUSAT is installed in 2005 for Audio-Visual class lectures applicable in various programs. A good number of reference books, online journals (INFLIBNET N-List) and textbooks are accessible by the students and faculty in main library and PG libraries. Good amount of computer and printer for office work, departmental activities, laboratory for learning

computer and projector is available for quality oriented academic activities. Trees and small plants surrounds the college, which is the sign of better environment friendly campus.

Students are regular to their classes; all are disciplined dynamic and much interested in the field of higher education along with other extra-curricular activities (ECA). A large number of students are enrolled from villages, and this is important for this college to provide improved education opportunities to them. The socially underprivileged students from SC/ST and OBC communities get financial assistance including poor students from General category. The fee reimbursement and scholarship from Government of Uttar Pradesh is also available for them in government scheme for post-matric students.

The career guidance cell/ committee is functional and students are advised to opt suitable course work during the admission procedure. This guidance not only helps the students to get admission in the appropriate course, however employment opportunities also manageable to them after finishing the course/ program. Training programs are organized for the students to understand better on employment opportunities in government and private sectors. Students participates in curricular and other non-academic activities, which enhance their capabilities to recognize their role in society. The performance of students in education (especially results) is outstanding. The college facilitates National Service Scheme (NSS) with two units, Ranger and Youth Red Cross Society (students volunteered in 2010 and 2012, Red Ribbon Express train arrival in Akbarpur), in which students participates to serve the society in appropriate manner. Students are selected as volunteer at the district and state level to be the '*Power Angeles*' to stop the crime against women and girls.

The principal being DDO of this college manage all the academic and financial activities. The head/principal of this institute decide all the academic arrangements. The 'committees' takes the important decision on various academic and non-academic activities, headed by principal. The Government of Uttar Pradesh appoints the faculties, after recommendation and selection from Public Service Commission of Uttar Pradesh. The UGC guidelines (2010, 2016, and amended rules) are followed by the Directorate and Department of Higher Education, Uttar Pradesh in appointment and promotion of the faculty members.

Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) monitors all the academic and non-academic activities in the college. The coordinator of the IQAC, manage all the documents related to promotion of the faculties (under CAS, stipulated by UGC) including other academic accomplishments. The cell ensures the quality augmentation in academic activities. In addition, the IQAC prepares the AQAR, and send it to NAAC, Bangalore online.

Several academic programs like– talks, seminars and discussion, symposia are organized in every academic calendar, which are helpful for the students. College organized annual sport competition at the college level. Students from various courses take part in the competitions in the guidance of Assistant Professor of Physical Education. The department of Physical Education annually brings the report and send to the Directorate of Higher Education of UP. Students also take part in the inter-collegiate, university, state, national level of sport competitions and manage the position with distinctions as well. Implementation of innovation is the main academic agenda of this college. Faculty and students are engaged in various inventive practices. The college has espoused energy conservation and environment friendly campus using latest technologies since 2011, after NAAC process. The E-waste management, water harvesting tools and conserving flora, are the part of innovative ideas, carry out solely by the UG and PG scholars.

College use various other methods to involve its students in academic and extra-curricular activities. The wall magazine/ poster, discussion on contemporary national and international events, observation of international days (like UN and UN Human Rights) and contribution in the college magazine '*Pahal*', (previously *Manogya*) under the guidance of college committees, are completed by the students of this college. Their articles, writings and suggestions get the proper place in the college magazine, which is helpful for them to learn in better and pragmatic way.

Moreover, college **strength** (**S**) is its quality management; student and faculty members altogether play an imperious role to enhance the academic milieu of this college. Being the fully government managed college; Ramabai Government Mahila PG College ensures not only the basic facilities, though tries to increase the facilities in apposite manner for academic activities properly.

There are few **weaknesses** (**W**), which could be found in this college. The limited financial resource/ aid from government and other agencies, creates hurdles in managing the essential facilities. Non-appointment of faculty through either new positing or transfer is a challenge to keep the faculty-students ratio accurately. The less student registration due to the newly opened other self-finance higher learning institutes neighboring this college is a major impediment for it to increase its enrollment after 2013-14.

College retain various **opportunities** (**O**) to boost its excellence in academic arena. The use of ICT in the academic events organized by the college, ensures the quality concern of this college. The special help to needy and deprived students is an opportunity for this college to provide proper academic support to them. The extension activities help students to learn better, beside course work in UG and PG programs.

There are few **challenges** (**C**) present in delivering the academic excellence to its students and stakeholders. The limited decision-making, limited financial resource and late policymaking process from the Department of Higher Education are the major challenges, which affect the academic setting of this college. The lower number of registration in various courses and inappropriate faculty-student ratio intensify the worries for this college.

Even so, this college would continue deliver the academic excellence and would maintain its stated vision, mission and objectives in future as well, and outstrip all the challenges. In coming days, the research work activities would be increased through PhD courses, research projects and student centric research activities for PG scholars. The professional courses would be opened, if approved by the government and affiliated/ parent University.





Ramabai Government Women Post Graduate College since its establishment in June 1997, emerged as a standard educational institute for women scholars. The motto of this college is *"Siddhi Bhawati Karmanah"*, means college believes in excellence through dedication and efforts. The vision, mission and objectives of the college is as follows:

Vision: Ramabai Government Mahila Post Graduate College provides enhanced educational opportunities to female scholars to sustain and succeed with enriched skill and potential after graduate and post graduate programs. Being a higher education institute, this college equips scholars with the abilities essential to retort the opportunities and challenges accompanying moving societal and economic changes of India.

Mission: The mission of this college is to accentuate behavioral and value oriented teaching to encourage the ethos of shared aims. Principal and faculties of this college are continually involve in preparing themselves to stay updated of the latest developments in the academics. College carry out the professional development support for faculty, staff and students through career counseling, academic and classified staff development mechanism for mounting opportunities and advance knowledge base.

Objectives: The objective of the college is to indulge in academic prosperity by classroom lectures, seminars, debates, and extra-curricular activities. The institution follows the educational norms and standards of the University Grants Commission (UGC) and Department of Higher Education, Government of Uttar Pradesh. The use of ICT for the modern way of acquiring knowledge is the main objective of this college. College get support and ideas of the stakeholders, faculty, students and staff for improvement of academic and infrastructural facilities in it. The students are guided for the service to the humanity; society and nation through value oriented learning, knowledge and abilities supported broadly by this college.

1.1.2 How does the institution develop and deploy action plans for effective implementation of the curriculum? Give details of the process and substantiate through specific example(s).

College follows academic calendar prepared in each academic session approved by the Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC). The implementation of curriculum through e-sources, presentation (PPT), lectures, e-contents and debates, group discussion, talks is based on the preparation done in each academic session. This not only provide knowledge to the scholars, however a broad understanding is developed for the graduate students in social sciences/ arts, science and commerce streams. College effectively follows the combined course structure approved by the affiliated University and Department of Higher Education, UP altogether at Under Graduate level. As far as the Post Graduate curriculum is concerned, college implements the course structure and related activities as made available by the affiliated university.

Beside course structure, the preparation of curriculum too suggested by this college during the core academic council meetings at the university. It is important for the college to implement curriculum or course structure properly for improved output in higher education. Scholars and faculty discuss the curriculum design twice in an academic year, the suggestions and other changes referred to the university for required inputs.

Since year 2011 and after NAAC Cycle 1, college continuously followed the curriculum structure suggested by the university, the use of ICT linked with curriculum has been encouraged among the faculty and students to get benefit in the changing academic environments and discipline. The undergraduate course work in arts and social sciences was changed in 2012, and implemented in academic session in 2013-2014 approved by the universities of Uttar Pradesh, the criteria was adopted in science and commerce under graduate programs as well. The present curriculum design is based on new changes and dimensions happening in the higher education in India and global level.

1.1.3 What type of support (procedural and practical) do the teachers receive (from the University and/or institution) for effectively translating the curriculum and improving teaching practices?

Teachers or faculties of this college are involve in structuring the curriculum through suggestions and inputs after conceptual analysis. Faculties are encouraged by the Principal of the college and get instructions from the university for managing the curriculum structure. The new themes and theories are added in the course structure, which usually deals with the changing scenario in the higher education for improved teaching practices.

Numerous initiatives adopted by this college for effective curriculum delivery and transaction are as follows:

- Project and models in Science subjects including Mathematics
- Small e-learning workshops for UG and PG scholars
- Organizing National seminar, Departmental Seminar, Debates, Symposiums and Talks
- Guest lectures on relevant subject matter
- Group discussion and programs on contemporary issues
- Managing interdisciplinary and interdepartmental curriculums
- Collaboration with other higher education institute, implementation of suggestions provided by parents, stakeholders, locals and other intellectual bodies

1.1.5 How does the institution network and interact with beneficiaries such as industry, research bodies and the university in effective operationalization of the curriculum?

Institution actively connects with the industry, research bodies, and the university in the effective operationalization of the curriculum. Students and faculty members are frequently in contact with the industry nearby Ambedkar Nagar district. Academic contribution in the college is managed by this college through Research Bodies, which are in contact with our scholars for educational progress. Faculties are encouraged to contribute academically through memberships of different academic bodies. As far as the university is concerned, faculties often visit university for curriculum design and student feedback for the curriculum sent by the college to the university for improvements and changes.

Our college contribute continuously in the curriculum structure and formulation of the affiliated university. Since year 2013, the unified pattern of curriculum is designed and implemented by the University. Nonetheless, the faculty do participate in the curriculum design at the university and same implemented in this college. The suggestions from the feedback is generated and submitted to the university for enhancement of course design as per global standards. The undergraduate course in arts/ social science, science and commerce streams are updated and possess the skill, value and job oriented structure.

Institution has adopted the quality control mechanism for the appropriate execution of curriculum to fulfill the intents of higher education learning. IQAC and the Principal of this institute ensures justification of value oriented learning structured in the curriculum for transforming scholars into intellectuals to serve better in the society. Institution ensures that the feedbacks related to curriculum must be thoroughly analyzed and reported to the affiliated university. Faculties are asked to get update of their concerned subject/ course through orientation and refresher programs, so that they could deliver best to their students.

College offer regular course/ programs in Arts/ Social Sciences, Science and Commerce subjects mostly at graduate level and 5 (five) courses in postgraduate level especially in Arts/ Social Sciences. Apart from these course work/ curriculum, college does not offer any certificate, diploma and skill development related courses. Instead, IGNOU center at the college, offer many course related to diploma and certificate programs.

This college does not offer and twinning/ dual degree programs so far. Being an affiliated college, it is not autonomous to offer such a twinning programs.

College follows the regular patterns of curriculum and course structure of affiliated university. At the Under Graduate (UG) level, the Arts/ Social Sciences are offered in nine subjects, Science stream offer the combination of Mathematics and Botany, Zoology subject as the main. In addition, the Department of Commerce offer its papers in three-year annual course structure system.

Moreover, at the Post Graduate (PG) level, the five subjects are offered with limited seats with two years of course work. All courses are core in terms of availing degree after successfully completing the programs.

Apart from the details mentioned above, no other methods for offering the course or flexibility or academic mobility is adopted by the college and instructed by the affiliating university.

This higher educational institute always take initiatives to ensure that the curriculum must be followed and the planning to enrich the curriculum design is sort out and sent to the affiliated university, which is an extra contribution to the course/ curriculum design. During the course work, the institution tries to focus on delivering the advanced subject matter to UG and PG scholars, so that best could be focused and achieved, which is an addition to curriculum execution.

Institution's goal is to nurture with skilled and pragmatic understanding of rural women scholars, who are registered in large number in this government college due to less fee structure. College ensures that the goal of this institution is achieved through appropriate academic environment present in this college.

1.3.2 What are the efforts made by the institution to enrich and organize the curriculum to enhance the experiences of the students so as to cope with the needs of the dynamic employment market?

Institution tries to enrich the and organize the curriculum through feedback and efforts by faculty at the college for best delivery of the course content via e-teaching, seminar, symposiums, talks and debates. Students are involved in academic decision so that best could be done in the academic field. Professional management idea and skill taught while dealing with curriculum. This help the scholars to cope with the requirements of employable market in the competitive age of globalization.

1.3.3 Enumerate the efforts made by the institution to integrate the cross cutting issues such as Gender, Climate Change, Environment Education, Human Rights, ICT etc., into the curriculum.

There are quite a lot of efforts made by the institution to integrate cross cutting issue, they are:

- Gender sensitization committee on sexual harassment is at proper place to examine complains related to women scholars and female faculty member. Gender related awareness campaign i.e. 'save girl child and educate girls' is organized by the National Service Scheme (NSS) and Ranger units of this college outside the campus.
- Students are supported by the faculty and college administration to get women friendly academic environment and do better in the society.
- All the departments, especially Science faculty usually organize environment related workshops, debates and awareness campaigns in and outside the College campus. The NSS units of this college, goes to the nearby villages/ rural areas and semi-urban areas

to promote environment related responsiveness, climate change discussions, and pollution control ideas among the common masses.

- College ensures that the no human right violation should be occurred in the campus. And, the gender related violations is totally prohibited, and women rights (for scholars and female faculty members/ staff) are well-kept-up by the committee concerned at the college. Every year in December on Human Rights Day, college takes pledge to promote the human rights awareness, and the Department of Political Science organize special lectures on Human Rights to know the basics of right granted by the state.
- College is well equipped with ICT tools and every faculty and departments uses the eteaching, e-learning and internet applications to deliver the academic arguments and quality. E-Library has been established in the central library with internet connected computers for UG and PG scholars and faculty members. Moreover, scholars are encouraged to use the ICT tools, such as Wi-Fi, computer, projector and sources obtainable through EDUSAT, so that the goal of Digitalization of India could be attained in apposite manner.

1.3.4 What are the various value-added courses/enrichment programs offered to ensure holistic development of students?

moral and ethical values

There are no such specific courses are taught at this college, nonetheless, during the various extracurricular programs, value oriented and skill development lectures organized for the students. So that they could get benefitted by it. IGNOU center at this college offer value added courses for the needy students.

employable and life skills

Employable and skills for successful and better life are delivered to the students during the career counselling and programs organized by the NSS and Ranger. There is no any specific course work for the employment and life skill separately.

better career options

Career options are advised to the students by the concerned committee at the college, which display and tell the students for their career opportunities, these are without any specific course offered to the students from the affiliated university.

community orientation

The community orientation is taught through extracurricular activities, the NSS play a major role in the community oriented learning for university affiliated courses only. And, there is no any specific course or programs are offered by this college or affiliated university.

1.3.5 Citing a few examples enumerate on the extent of use of the feedback from stakeholders in enriching the curriculum?

The organized feedback and response from the stakeholders on curriculum is analyzed by the college and sent to the course controlling university for perfection and enrichment. The feedback from parents, students, and faculties along with stakeholders play a key role improving the course design and curriculum development. All the views and suggestions are recorded and reported to the university for make changes according to the need and assessment.

1.3.6 How does the institution monitor and evaluate the quality of its enrichment programs?

Institute does not offer value added course work, nonetheless, the IGNOU center at this college offer value added programs other than the regular university affiliated courses. Institution occasionally get response and suggestions from the students and tries to focus on quality oriented input to enrich the career guidance, ethical and value oriented learning. These steps not only help the scholars, although academic excellence of this institute increases as well. Internal quality committee appraises the teaching and learning methods adopted by the college and help to promote the enrichment programs.

1.4 Feedback System

1.4.1 What are the contributions of the institution in the design and development of the curriculum prepared by the University?

The institution tries to focus on best course design, and faculties from this institution/ college usually provide suggestions to the course affiliating university for development of course content. The feedback from the students, stakeholders and faculty members always considered and reported to the university before beginning of academic sessions. The academic council of the affiliated university sought the suggestions on course design and program structure from the college, so that course content might be more focused and fulfill the need of the students from undergraduate and post graduate classes.

1.4.2 Is there a formal mechanism to obtain feedback from students and stakeholders on Curriculum? If 'yes', how is it communicated to the University and made use internally for curriculum enrichment and introducing changes/ new programs?

Yes, the IQAC under the guidance of Principal provides feedback format to the scholars and ask them to write about the course design and programs. The developed format is provided to the stakeholders for proper suggestions about the curriculum.

All the feedback from the students, stakeholders and faculties are studied by the committee for quality enhancement, the IQAC, and then the appropriate report is

generated and sent to the affiliated university. The same suggestions from the report are applied at the institutional level, and college administration allows the introduction of new course work and programs with the permission from the Department of Higher Education, Government of Uttar Pradesh and affiliated university. For example, in 2007, the five new post graduate arts and social science courses were introduced.

1.4.3 How many new programs/courses were introduced by the institution during the last four years? What was the rationale for introducing new courses/programs?)

There is no new introduction of programs/courses during the last four academic years. However, the institution has planned to introduce new programs MSc and MCom at post graduate level and BPE at graduate level.

Other relevant information regarding curricular aspects:

College not only planned the introducing of new regular courses, however the introduction of professional courses is desired as well. As per Peer Team during the NAAC process in April 2011, the team suggested that the new professional courses like fisheries, agriculture should be opted by the college for greater benefit of scholars and society. A letter demanding the introduction of course work was sent to the Government of Uttar Pradesh in late 2011, and the demand is pending with the government, which is main authority to finalize and permit to introduce such value added, enriched and professional courses and programs.

CRITERION II: TEACHING-LEARNING AND EVALUATION

2.1 Student Enrollment and Profile

2.1.1 How does the college ensure publicity and transparency in the admission process?

College ensures the publicity before the academic session starts in July each year, notify the admission process in the local newspaper, through Internet, and publicizing the admission process through pamphlets. The brochure for admission along with admission form printed before the admission process begins.

The admission forms sold in June-July is each academic session and students asked to mention the qualifying marks in the required column and attach the document proof. In late July, the merit list for the undergraduate courses prepared departmental wise under the guidance of Principal/ administration and admission committee to ensure the transparency.

The reservation criteria as per directions of Government of India (GOI) and Government of Uttar Pradesh is taken into consideration and the students from marginalized, backward and minority community (OBC, SC, ST and Religious Minorities) are admitted in this college to encourage the social justice. The admission process for postgraduate scholars begins in first week of August and the Head of Departments of PG courses under the supervision of Principal notify the admission process.

2.1.2 Explain in detail the criteria adopted and process of admission (Ex. (i) merit (ii) common admission test conducted by state agencies and national agencies (iii) combination of merit and entrance test or merit, entrance test and interview (iv) any other) to various programs of the Institution.

The criteria for admission is exclusively on the 'merit' based on qualified exams, which is required for the admission in graduate (BA/BSc/BCom) and post graduate (MA) programs. The college displays the name and position of students, qualified in merit for the admission with details marks.

The waiting list is also displayed, if the seats remain vacant. The same admission list of merit is uploaded on the college website for wide publicity as well.

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The other educational institute/ college in the Ambedkar Nagar district too follow the merit based admission system. The Government Post Graduate College, Alapur and BNKB PG College in Akbarpur, Ambedkar Nagar established for co-education, displays merit for qualified scholars who seeks admission in various programs. The maximum percentage is 100 and the lowest is 45 percentages as suggested and instructed by the university.

2.1.4 Is there a mechanism in the institution to review the admission process and student profiles annually? If 'yes' what is the outcome of such an effort and how has it contributed to the improvement of the process?

Yes, there is a well-placed mechanism in the institution to review the admission process and student profile. The college committee on admissions and IQAC coordinator checks the student profile and the process of admission annually to improve more. Students from different background are admitted in the courses/ programs offered by this college. The systematic analysis of application for admission is done and the data is kept into the records of IQAC.

After the first cycle (2011) of NAAC, the college admission committee has initiated the review procedure of admission and finds that the students prefer Home Science and Sociology in compassion to other arts/ social science subject, this has led the requirement of enhanced counselling system, which has systemized the admission process with newer approach.

The students from minority community, preferred this government post-graduate college in the admission to Science and Commerce, this trends have started in the academic session of 2012-13.

2.1.5 Reflecting on the strategies adopted to increase/improve access for following categories of students, enumerate on how the admission policy of the institution and its student profiles demonstrate/reflect the National commitment to diversity and inclusion

Institution has adopted several policies, which reflects in the admission policy for diversity and inclusion of the different sections of society:

SC/ST:

The institution follows the norms suggested and instructed by the government for the admission of SC/ ST scholars. During the merit listing, the reservation criteria followed and minimum percentage for the admission is reduced to comply the government decisions.

• OBC:

The reservation measures followed for the OBC in the admission process and college ensures to adhere with the instructions provided.

Women:

The college admit only women scholars/ students in the UG and PG programs.

• Differently abled:

The differently abled students get admission in the college against the reserved seats available for them. College ensures that special care should be taken for the students who differently abled, moreover, the ramp has been created at the entrance for such students for their easy movements.

Economically weaker sections:

Special preference is given while admitting the rural and economically weaker students. The college helps students from low-income background and financial assistance is made available to them.

The state government provides scholarships including reimbursement of fees to the economically weaker students of all sections of the society as well.

Minority community:

College admits the monitory students as per availability of seats in different courses. Such students provided scholarship and support from the college admission committee without any religious prejudice.

Any other

The weightage for the sport quota is made available during the admission for the students who hold best records/ achievements in sports.

The table mentioned above shows the trends in increase and decrease in seats in last four academic sessions (2012-13 to 2015-16). There are few reasons in the less demand for admission in the UG programs, and these are:

- There is sudden rise of self-finance colleges in the last four years nearby college
- The student prefers nearby educational institutes, which are closer to their home/ residence

Conversely, there is a lot of demand for the Science and other PG programs/ courses by admission seekers, which are explicitly run by our college.

2.2 Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 How does the institution cater to the needs of differently-abled students and ensure adherence to government policies in this regard?

College formulates the admission policy according to the government norms and apply it during the admission process. In addition, college adhere with the government reservation policy for the differently abled students to ensure that the proper justice deliver to them during the admission.

The ramps, wheel chair and other basic facilities are provided to the differently abled students for their academic prosperity.

2.2.2 Does the institution assess the students' needs in terms of knowledge and skills before the commencement of the program? If 'yes', give details on the process.

Yes, the college/ institution assess the student's knowledge before the commencement of academic programs. During the fresh session, students are asked for the reason of admission in certain courses. A counselling procedure is implemented by the college during the beginning of the session to ensure that the benefit of course work should be clear for the scholars opted for graduate or post graduate admission.

2.2.3 What are the strategies adopted by the institution to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students (Bridge/Remedial/ Add-on/Enrichment Courses, etc.) to enable them to cope with the program of their choice?

After the admission procedure is over, college committee for student welfare arrange remedial classes to bridge the knowledge gap of enrolled weak students, and this helps them to manage the course/program of their choice.

2.2.4 How does the college sensitize its staff and students on issues such as gender, inclusion, environment etc.?

The gender sensitization committee against sexual harassment and gender inequality watch over the matter related to it. Regular meetings on gender questions, sensitization, and gender rights discussed through debates, talks and symposium. The departmental program is organized to make sure that the issue related to gender justice must not be ignored for students and female staff. The Student Welfare Committee (SWC) ensures the justice to socially marginalized admitted students in various programs.

The financial assistance provided to the students for their studies. Staffs are supported by the government measures, which ensure justice to them. As far as the environment related issues are concerned, numerous programs on environmental protection and awareness curricula is implemented among the students to be aware regarding environmental protection.

2.2.5 How does the institution identify and respond to special educational/learning needs of advanced learners?

The quiz competition, tests and mock viva is organized in the institution to identify and respond the requirement of advanced learners. Advanced learners are promoted through extracurricular activities, debates and group discussion. These processes help them to perform better at requisite time. 2.2.6 How does the institute collect, analyze and use the data and information on the academic performance (through the program duration) of the students at risk of drop out (students from the disadvantaged sections of society, physically challenged, slow learners, economically weaker sections etc. who may discontinue their studies if some of support is not provided)?

The college collects the data of weaker students based on their performance in the class, results of exam, and social background (ST, SC, OBC, religious minorities, economically weak). The needy students are provided not only the financial assistance, nevertheless, the counselling by the college committee and faculties concerned convey better performance to them.

College during the new course work/ programs in every academic session, try to identify such students, who may leave the study in between the academic sessions. A special care like remedial, counselling and financial support is taken to reduce or stop dropout rates of academically weaker students.

2.3 Teaching-Learning Process

2.3.1 How does the college plan and organize the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules? (Academic calendar, teaching plan, evaluation blue print, etc.).

In every academic session, college prepares academic calendar to complete academic task smoothly. The IQAC of the college decides the academic events along with other extracurricular activities from the month of July to June, each year. The teaching plan also discussed with departments, and the college administration and IQAC plays an important role in finalizing academic work.

The inter evaluation is done by college i.e. viva-voce, practical, though the external evaluation i.e. answer sheets, is centralized and done by affiliated university. The university invites the faculty members of this college during the evaluation month. Faculties of Ramabai Government Mahila PG College, participates in the centralized evaluation system, which is done usually after annual exam and supplementary exams.

2.3.2 How does IQAC contribute to improve the teaching –learning process?

The IQAC with its chairperson, coordinator and members at the college, put all the efforts to augment the academic quality and atmosphere in the college. It tries to develop the quality parameters for various academic and administrative activities by enabling the learner-centric environment favorable to the quality education. The IQAC too arranges the feedback response from students, parents and alumni of the institution and proposes the ideas for curriculum design.

Faculties of this college get benefit from the IQAC for the improvement of their academic quality. The IQAC endorse the arrangements for seminars, symposium, talks,

debates and conferences on quality-related themes within the college. It helps in the documentation and records of the various programs and activities leading to quality improvement, which is important for quality culture in the institution. Furthermore, the IQAC prepares the Annual Quality Assurance Report (AQAR) with the consultation of all the departmental council and submit it online to NAAC.

2.3.3 How is learning made more student-centric? Give details on the support structures and systems available for teachers to develop skills like interactive learning, collaborative learning and independent learning among the students?

Our college provides opportunities for best academic learning and facilities to grow their potential. The support mechanism for students is provide by our learned faculties in social sciences, arts, sciences and commerce disciplines, who usually advice their students in responsive manner in and outside of the class and follow the Faculty-Student relationship mentioned in UGC regulations 2010. The inquiry from students and up-to-date response from faculties is the best practice adopted by the college; student may approach their faculties for any queries outside the class as well.

The academic and extracurricular activities at the college create a vibrant academic environment at the college, which is our best practice for academic excellence. The IQAC along with its faculty members ensure that the learning techniques at the college is to be more focused, value oriented, theoretical, pragmatic and professional. The ICT tools, academic milieu and advance infrastructure in the college helps faculty to deliver their conceptual lecture for appropriate learning by the scholars.

2.3.4 How does the institution nurture critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among the students to transform them into life-long learners and innovators?

The college especially focus on analytical and value oriented teaching skills, which is essential for the students today. Students get involved in the analytical learning, which is a best way to understand the society and surroundings. We ensure that the students of this college to develop their creativity by involving themselves in the up-to-date learning, developing a rational approach and manage the academic requirements for future. This academic approach helps them to be a good citizen for serving the national and society.

2.3.5 What are the technologies and facilities available and used by the faculty for effective teaching? Eg: Virtual laboratories, e-learning - resources from National Program on Technology Enhanced Learning (NPTEL) and National Mission on Education through Information and CommunicationTechnology (NME-ICT), open educational resources, mobile education, etc.

College has adopted debates, discussions, tutorial and e-learning techniques for

effective teaching. Presently, the world is moving faster, the quality and appropriate methods of teaching is important nowadays, our college understand the present academic requirement, and tries to focus on quality based teaching and learning. Use of modern technologies (NME-ICT) for teaching has been encouraged among faculties. The PPT, E-content, EDUSAT (for distant learning), digital library (CD/ DVD/ Flash Drives), e-source and audio-visual are available in the college for effective teachings.

2.3.6 How are the students and faculty exposed to advanced level of knowledge and skills (blended learning, expert lectures, seminars, workshops etc.)?

College ensures that the faculty and students get best opportunities to avail the domain of knowledge in the time excess digitalization. The seminars, workshop, expert lectures and mixed learning is available for faculties and students. College usually organize extracurricular activities on various themes for better understanding of information around, which is useful for our faculties and students together. The academic progress of college is beneficial to both faculty and student to get advance knowledge and captivate skills.

2.3.7 Detail (process and the number of students benefitted) on the academic, personal and psycho-social support and guidance services (professional counseling/mentoring/academic advise) provided to students?

College provides counselling to the students during the course work, which helps them to manage their academic achievement and maintain the career in future. The guidance and psychosocial support is helpful for the UG students, who wants to join the PG course, and appear in the competitive exams as well. A committee in the college advise the students for their career prospects and selection of best courses available during the admission process. In the last four years (2012-16), total 175 students acquired benefit from the college initiative through counselling and psychological support.

2.3.8 Provide details of innovative teaching approaches/methods adopted by the faculty during the last four years? What are the efforts made by the institution to encourage the faulty to adopt new and innovative approaches and the impact of such innovative practices on student learning?

In the last four years, college has encompassed ICT tools for the advance teaching and learning skills for the benefit of women scholars admitted in various courses. Faculties are asked to attend their career oriented programs/ training i.e. orientation, refresher (in particular subject), summer and winter course guided by the University Grants Commission (UGC) and, sometime a week training programs organized by the Department of Higher Education, Government of Uttar Pradesh. The knowledge gain by the faculties also helps the students to accustom with advance teaching and learning abilities.

2.3.9 How are library resources used to augment the teaching- learning process?

Our college possesses good number of reference and test books available in the library including PG libraries. The e-journals, magazines, newspaper, competition related booklets are available in the library for UG and PG scholars. A reading room facility is provided to the students to utilize their time during the free periods. This not only helps the students to gain knowledge, nonetheless, create academic ambiance in the college additionally.

2.3.10 Does the institution face any challenges in completing the curriculum within the planned time frame and calendar? If 'yes', elaborate on the challenges encountered and the institutional approaches to overcome these.

Yes, our college completes its curriculum during the mentioned schedule in the academic calendar approved by the IQAC. Sometime our institute face challenges while managing the schedule mentioned in the academic calendar. The government and local holidays in Uttar Pradesh and organizing the supplementary exams takes much time that directly impact on the fixed schedule mentioned in the academic calendar.

2.3.11 How does the institute monitor and evaluate the quality of teaching learning?

College has created the quality control committee headed by the Principal as administrative officer to manage the academic mechanism. Moreover, the IQAC plays an important role in maintaining the academic progress of college by monitoring the departmental activities and performing the academic audit in academic and administrative capacities. The feedbacks from the students, parents, stakeholders, and faculties are evaluated to maintain the excellence of higher learning at this college.

2.4 Teacher Quality

Our being an entirely Government management College, it does not recruit its faculty; all the appointments/ recruitments are solely done by the Public Service Commission of Uttar Pradesh (UPPSC), after the necessities requested by Government of Uttar Pradesh. The UPPSC follows the minimum requirements stipulated in the UGC guidelines of 2010 and its amendments including May 2016. All the faculties are well qualified in this college to meet the changing requirements of the curriculum.

Teaching learning methods/approaches

College frequently organize talks, discussion and workshops on the quality education monitored by the IQAC. This ensures that the faculties could get maximum orientation and augment their skill to cope with changing educational needs.

Handling new curriculum

Faculties are trained by the IQAC to provide inputs in the curriculum design whenever asked by the affiliating university.

Content/knowledge management

The consultations and local seminar is helpful in the content and knowledge management, which is essential for faculty for their up-to-date skills in the teaching.

The selection of materials and its development for enrichment is done by the faculties, the refresher and orientation programs helps them to develop their capacity. College does not provide guidance any of the faculty in this regard.

No such training is arranged by the college for the academic assessment.

The training for the issues like gender equality and environment is self-centric, nonetheless, college support such issues and encourage the faculty member to be sensitive and adoptable while teaching and discussing the curriculum.

Audio Visual Aids/multimedia

The digital and e-awareness is important nowadays for the quality enhancement in the higher education, college often organize the technological (includes Audio-Visual Aids/ Multimedia) training to the faculty along with UG and PG students and staff to understand the digitalization in improved way.

• OER's

The training for utilize the OERs (Open Educational Resources) is done through workshops and talks arrange at the college level, the librarian-lecturer provides the knowledge and methods to manage the OERs.

• Teaching learning material development, selection and use

College promotes faculties to advance their skill in the teaching-learning material development, its selection and use with the academic training, which is organized by the IQAC.

College promotes its faculty to contribute his/her knowledge to the academic

institutes. Past four years, a number of faculty members of Ramabai Government Mahila PG College has contributed as resource persons in different academic programs. Approximately three percent of the total faculty members has contributed academically in different programs organized by external professional agencies.

participated in external Workshops/ Seminars/ Conferences recognized by national/international professional bodies

All the faculty members of this college has participated in the International Seminar, National Seminar, Conferences, Workshops recognized by the national and international professional bodies.

presented papers in Workshops / Seminars / Conferences conducted or recognized by professional agencies

Nearly 90 percent of the faculty members has contributed in the national and international seminars, symposium, conferences of professional bodies by presenting the academic writings.

College adopted the UGC's norms for assistance to its faculties. The Study Leave is granted by the college for their research work as per UGC and government (UP) guidelines. They encouraged to publish their academic writings i.e. Article in national or international journals/ magazines, Books, articles for newspaper. Faculties too provides consultancy services to industries at the local level.

Faculties of this college **have not yet received** any kind of awards/ recognition at the state and national level. However, college encourage faculties to perform better and be recognized by the government/ non-government agencies and get the awards.

Yes, college introduced the evaluation of faculty/ teachers by the students. Faculty get

feedback from students properly, however, a feedback proforma is distributed during the mid-academic session and asked them to return it before commencement of exams, so that students may provide their ratings, analysis and suggestions for their course in charge/ instructor to the IQAC.

The feedback is analyzed at the college internally and discussed in the committee (IQAC and other), and outcomes conveyed to the concerned faculty for his/her improvement, if required. No external peer review is done at the college level.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 How does the institution ensure that the stakeholders of the institution especially students and faculty are aware of the evaluation processes?

College organize the workshop/ talk at the beginning of each session, and the IQAC of this college points out the major academic improvement issues that has to be discussed with the faculty and students. The stakeholders i.e. faculties and students get aware by such programs organized at the beginning of the session, and the feedback forms for the students distributed in the mid of the academic session, and the faculty also provides their opinions in academic quality related meetings held monthly.

2.5.2 What are the major evaluation reforms of the university that the institution has adopted and what are the reforms initiated by the institution on its own?

The affiliated university annually conducts the exams and centralized evaluation system is followed by it, in which the faculties contribute in the evaluation system. The university has adopted the coding (code instead roll numbers) system in the science streams and same would be adopted in arts/ social sciences and commerce in days to come. The college follows the norms and regulation of the affiliating university and does not initiate and evaluation pattern on its own. Nonetheless, the college through tutorials, debates, essay writings, quizzes, and practical does the internal evaluation.

2.5.3 How does the institution ensure effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the university and those initiated by the institution on its own?

The affiliated university for the evaluation has adopted several norms, and asked the colleges to follow these norms. The videography during the viva-voce has been implemented recently for the transparency of the evaluation process. College ensures that during the viva-voce the directed rule from the affiliated University must not be overlooked.

College adopted the formative assessment of the students by debates, essay and quizzes, which determines the approach of the scholars for subjective knowledge and skills. The summative assessment is done internally, by viva-voce and externally by examination conducted by the university. The debates in the college helped the students to manage the learning skills and this approach helped them to perform better in the exams conducted by the university.

Students learn the notions, nurture and prepare themselves to serve the society. College ensure that the student should be a proper graduate, not merely a degree holder or professionals.

The grievances are listen and redressed by the college if and inadequacy fount during the internal evaluation. However, the external evaluation is the main cause of grievance, the excess enrolled student and their results sometime not justified. For that purpose, the affiliating university tries to redress the issue and solve through supplementary exams or reevaluation of the examination copies.

The students and staff are aware of these goals mentioning these to the college magazines, *Pahal* (previously *Manogya*) and on the website. The prospectus of this college clearly mentions the mission and objectives of this college.

Students especially from the commerce sections are guided to catch the opportunities available to them and get employed in the future.

At the beginning of session, the student results are analyzed by the committee concerned to check whether the focused academic goal was achieved or not. Usually this does not happen, and the students of this college has achieved better success in the exams, assessment and professional competitions. Quite a lot of alumni of this college are working in different places and serving the society adequately.

The institution monitor and ensure the learning outcomes by planning and its implementation. Students are asked to be regular in the classes and be in touch with course in charge in and outside the class academically. Attendance monitoring system is applied and course in charge are advised to engender the interest of learning particularly in the UG classes. The regular assessments of assignments, helps the faculty and student to teach and learn appropriately.

Till now no faculty of this institute is engaged in research activities of the affiliating university, though the files to be a research supervisor has been sent to the university for approval. Faculties have applied for research projects sponsored by the UGC, CSIR and ICSSR, however, sanctions are awaited. Three of our faculties have completed their research projects sponsored by various academic bodies/ agencies. Moreover, Head and Assistant Professor in Political Science, Dr. Mahendra Prakash, has supervised/ co-guided (external supervisor) and recommended for award of the degree of three MPhil scholars from Jawaharlal Nehru University, New Delhi.

3.5 Consultancy

College established institute–industry interface through sending its scholars at industries nearby Ambedkar Nagar district. The professional and management skills are experienced and learned appropriately by the students from Commerce stream at the industry. A group of students from our college along with faculty members of Commerce usually visits at the industries (rice mill, water purification plants, steel plant, fisheries, and timber) and observe the process of productivity and marketing technique, which increase behavioral understanding. These groups discuss the process and manufacturing ideas with the industrial management body and utilize them into their course work.

The industrial management often visit at the college for the talks, and they provide feedback on our course design and academic activities as external stakeholders.

Faculty of this college learned and experienced enough to provide consultancy

services whenever required or approached. However, these consultancy services are provided without opting any kind of remunerations. College encourage faculty members to provide consultancy services in the industries located in the district. Since our faculty are government 'gazette notified—class one' employee, college does not publicize the consultancy services.

College encourage the faculty members to utilize the expertize for consultancy through sending them to the required place by granting leave. There are no any available facilities for the faculty while offering consultancy services.

There are many places where our faculty members utilize their consultancy services. They often visit industries nearby college and discuss the managerial approach. Faculty also participate in the academic meetings at the affiliated university and suggests many issues that is important academically. The Ramabai Government Mahila Post Graduate College promote social responsibility and plays an active role in managing different tasks. The NSS units of this college always visits at nearby villages, semi urban areas and in city for awareness campaign. The NSS units literate common masses, participates in blood donation camps, gather for rallies during AIDS day, youth day, voter's day and other important days for social awareness. In 2012, all the students of this college actively volunteered for service when Red Ribbon Express train arrived in Akbarpur, Ambedkar Nagar for the second time.

College also have a large number of student volunteer for the Red Cross Society (YRC), and they contribute to the society through 'First Aid', wherever this service is necessary. The Ranger units of this college provide training to the common people for their rights, awareness on various issues and loyal to the society.

Our college students actively take participation in Women Help Line (1090) sponsored by Government of Uttar Pradesh in 2013-14. Some students are selected as Power Angles to assist the needy women/ girl when she is harassed. Faculty members of this college actively participated in the Family Court to solve the divorce, domestic violence and sexual harassment cases. Broad campaign for women empowerment, stop child marriage, gender equality, save girl child, educate girls and 'down the dowry system' campaign often organized by the college as well.

For the environment protection, students of college plant trees, organize rallies to protect the ecosystem, aware against global warming and climate change to the villagers and common people. College also organize debates, *nukkad natak*, and campaign with posters on Human Rights day every year.

In the year 2016, our scholars volunteered in voter awareness camps, through these camps, many youths who attained the voter age, has been included in the voter list. The SVEEP (Systematic Voters' Education and Electoral Participation) coordinator, Dr. Manoj Gupta, faculty member from the Department of Sociology is always active to provide service to the District Election Office for voter's camps, awareness and distributing the forms.

Our college organizes programs on certain international days, in 2016 on 24 October, Department of Political Science organized the UN day program to connote the importance 'peace' through International Organization. Our faculty Dr. Mahendra Prakash to expose the importance of UN in the world did the Power Point Presentation. Students were encouraged to publicize this program in their locality as well.

The cleanness drive is has become the part of curriculum in our college, and our students actively participates in the cleanness campaign directed by the UGC and Government of India. Our college for the awareness and use technology for smooth and speedy services also launched the digitalization campaign.

The special budget is for the seven days camp for both the NSS units, and the general budget is for one-day camp in which the awareness campaigns and social activities is

organized. In the last four years, the NSS units were engaged in different extension activities i.e. literacy programs in villages, sanitation, environment protection, sloganeering, women right awareness drive, voter registration campaign, prevention from AIDS, save girl child, educate girl child and social harmony. These programs help the society and masses to get knowledge and defense for various social ills, inhibition from infections, literate themselves, and most of all the protection of environment from advancement and urbanization with sustainable development.

Institute annually plan for the extension activities as social responsibilities and, discuss among the faculties and students for their cooperation in such programs at the beginning of the session. CRITERION IV: INFRASTRUCTURE AND LEARNING RESOURCES

4.1 Physical Facilities

4.1.1 What is the policy of the institution for creation and enhancement of infrastructure that facilitates effective teaching and learning?

Being fully government managed college; it offers best infrastructural facilities to its students, faculty and staff for apposite academic atmosphere. College always prefers the well up-to-date facilities, which is required for the academic and extracurricular activities. A large number of classrooms, auditorium, laboratories, library, reading room, sport room, Principal chamber, two offices, IQAC office, IGNOU center office, PG building, NSS office, music room, examination control office, separate restrooms for scholars, faculties and a faculty meeting room is available in the college. These facilities develops the quality and fulfill academic requirements, which are essential in higher education.

College plans at the beginning of each academic year to purchase the required apparatus for science, furniture, stationary, books, computer and ICT tools within the budget made available by the government and UGC. This institution ensures that the budget must be utilized to enhance the education quality, cater the need of students, and cope with the newer academic development around the world. The purchase committee and IQAC in its meeting annually, discusses about the infrastructure that has to be increased for effective academic output.

4.1.2 **Detail the facilities available for**

a. Curricular and co-curricular activities–classrooms, technology enabled learning spaces, seminar halls, tutorial spaces, laboratories, botanical garden, Animal house, specialized facilities and equipment for teaching, learning and research etc.

College owns enormous facilities essential for curricular and extra-curricular activities (ECA) to enhance the teaching and learning skills. The details mentioned below:

Classrooms: The classrooms are well maintained with lightings, furniture, maps and writing boards for modest conveyance of lectures and adoptable learnings. The PPT methods could be used in the classes of this college if required.

Technology enabled learning space: College has well equipped EDUSET installed since 2005, which is an effective ICT tool for distant audio-visual learning, the INFLIBNET and software for data access catalog in library, projector enabled auditorium, classrooms and the Wi-Fi for students is useful for modern way of learning. For extra-curricular a well managed and technology equipped auditorium is available in the college premises.

Seminar Hall: We have one seminar hall/ auditorium with siting capacity of 250 people for academic, co-curricular and extra-curricular programs. It is properly equipped with PPT wide screen, sound, amplifier, microphone etc. to carry out all the institutional academic activities.

Tutorial Spaces: The classroom and MOS in the college premises used as tutorial space. We do not have any separate tutorial space for academic work.

Laboratories: This College have Science and Home Science laboratories for UG and PG scholars. All the basic and specialized equipment are available for student to solve their problems in labs and attain knowledge while discussing theoretical fragments of the curriculum. College has purchased new equipment in these courses for practical events during class hours. Recently in 2014-15, the Department of Chemistry installed LPG pipeline for practical, and Department of Home Science purchased electronic oven, induction cooktop and replaced the refrigerator with newer one.

Botanical Garden: We have enough space for greenery and plantations, all the essential plants and herbs, which are required for the course work (BSc in Botany), are planted in the college premises. The diverse types of plants could be found in this college. Every year, the science and non-science student plant different trees ground and herbs in the vessel for balance and maintenance of environment.

Animal House: College does not have animal house and no additional space has been provided for such requirement yet.

Specialized facilities: The technology (ICT) enabled facilities is available in the classroom, labs and in the auditorium/ seminar hall. Supplementary and other facilities would be considered timely, if required for enhancement of quality education and academic works.

b. Extra-curricular activities – sports, outdoor and indoor games, gymnasium, auditorium, NSS, NCC, cultural activities, Public speaking, communication skillsdevelopment, yoga, health etc.

Sports: A vast ground is available for the sport activities associated with outdoor games. The indoor games are organized in the game room in the college building premises, all the important events in sports are taught, and sport activities take place throughout the year. The annual sport events took place in January or February every year, and the students do participate in the sports events enthusiastically. The game instructor and faculty of Department of Physical Education, prepares and instructs the students for indoor and outdoor sport events. College annually review the sport requirement and facilities, and the new equipment are purchased. Additionally, the ground for basketball has been

proposed for the upcoming academic session.

Outdoor and Indoor Games: College owns all the required equipment and facilitates including space or ground for sport events. The football, hockey, cricket kit, javelin, discus, disc, handball is available in the college for outdoor events. The table tennis, chess, carom, racquets etc. are available for the indoor sport activities.

Gymnasium: The gymnasium room has been included in the sport/ game room and all the equipment facilitating this requirement is properly managed.

NSS: There are two units has been arranged for NSS activities by the affiliated university. A well-furnished room and office is arranged for all the NSS activities. The NSS coordinators achieve all the NSS associated activities with the help of two units consisting 100 students in each. The budget for the NSS activities are made available by the university to manage the camps and one-day programs.

NCC: There is **no NCC unit is present in the college**. However, a proposal or the NCC units has been sent to the concerned authority (in New Delhi) to arrange a NCC unit in this college.

Cultural Activities: The College actively engaged its scholars in the cultural activities. The Department of Music play a significant role for organizing and managing all the cultural events, especially drama, dance, singing or vocal, instrumental activities. Students across the departments are encouraged and directed to participate in such events. All the instruments are accessible in the Department of Music. College ensures the purchase and maintenance the musical instruments as per requirement.

Public Speaking: The students of this college usually participates in the debates and encouraged by the faculty as well. The important and socially relevant issues are discussed among students in the group to develop and enhance their speaking skills.

Communication skill development: The communication skill development is enhanced and invigorated by the faculty in the concerned classrooms during lecture, nonetheless, the programs organized by the Departmental Councils provide chance to the students to develop their oratory talents.

Yoga: The *yoga* activities is managed by the Department of Physical Education in the zero-period in class hours. The sport room has been assigned for '*yoga*' allied activities and the basic facilities has been made available in the same room.

Health and Hygiene: College usually contact the district hospital for health related issue if arises among the students or its faculty and staff. The ambulance

service could be called any time, whenever it is necessary. Nonetheless, the Department of Physical Education, Department of Home Science along with Department of Chemistry often organize the health and hygiene related awareness camps in the college and try to teach every student the basic health aid facts and attentiveness. A First Aid box is constantly available in the Department of Home Science during emergency health threats.

4.1.3. How does the institution plan and ensure that the available infrastructure is in line with its academic growth and is optimally utilized? Give specific examples of the facilities developed/augmented and the amount spent during the last four years (Enclose the Master Plan of the Institution / campus and indicate the existing physical infrastructure and the future planned expansions if any).

The institution, Ramabai Government Mahila Post Graduate College, utilizes its infrastructure in the best way, which are available for teaching and learning. The classrooms, which are equipped in the modern way, are utilized for UG and PG teaching and learning. The white boards with marker, PPT projection, and computer facility is available for the students of Science in their laboratories.

The UG and PG classes for Arts/ Humanities/ Social Sciences and commerce are furnished with basic ICT facilities as well, and properly utilized for course work/ tutorial, practical and sensible learning. In the last four years 2012-2016, no extension/ construction was planned, except utilization of budget sanctioned through *Rashtriya Uchchattar Shiksha Abhiyaan* (RUSA) for PG extension building (three standard classrooms). Rupees 41, 05,740.00 (INR) was sanctioned in March 2015 for this college under development scheme for colleges directed by MHRD, Government of India and UGC.

The college building is much capacious and the campus includes playground, parking, restrooms, botanical garden, water conservation pond and other basic facilities like—canteen, drinking water stand, electric generator shade, ramps and Adoptable and Multipurpose Open Space (A/MOS) etc. Our institution ensures the quality education for its scholars and basic though advance facilities to faculty and staff.

College has planned to renovate the faculty sitting room with AC and large LCD monitor. The proposal for hostel facility has been dispatched to authorities for women scholars and the quarters for faculty was proposed in 2012 and same has been sent to directorate for implementation. A separate computer lab for students is proposed in coming years based on budget availability from the sanctioning authority (Government of UP) or from other sources.




Chart 1: THE MASTER PLAN

4.1.4. How does the institution ensure that the infrastructure facilities meet the requirements of students with physical disabilities?

College safeguard proper justice for the students, who are physically disabled (*divyang*) and all the supported facilities provided to them. The ramp and wheelchair is accessible at college, moreover a women assistant from the Group D employee always available to assist such student. College preferably manage classes at the ground floor for such needy student.

Hostel Facility – Accommodation available

College does not have hostel facility yet, though a proposal for accommodating 200 occupant (capacity) has been sent to the Social Welfare authorities of Government of Uttar Pradesh for financial assistance to construct the hostel.

As mentioned before, college has proposed the hostel facility for its UG and PG scholars to be constructed in coming years. The other facilities like-recreational, gymnasium, yoga activity classes is available for the day scholars. Internet connected computer facility for the day scholars/ students is available inside the college premises. The hotspot for Wi-Fi has been installed as per Department of Higher Education, Government of Uttar Pradesh directions and assistance. The medical facilities are in proper way for needy students during emergency. The library, common room and audiovisual tools are available for the day scholars and they utilize these services whenever they required. College have safe drinking water for students, staffs, and faculty. A security guard is appointed by the college with the permission of Directorate of Higher Education, Allahabad, Uttar Pradesh for security of the college campus during day and night. In addition, the CCTV has been fixed around and inside the college building for proper surveillance.

4.1.6 What are the provisions made available to students and staff in terms of health care on the campus and off the campus?

The provisions for health care for students and staff is easily available within the college, on a critical condition the patient immediately sent to the district hospital which is not much for away. The first aid is available in the college campus, while the facility to admit sick student or staff during emergency, the OPD/ emergency medical care is easily available after the emergency is communicated to the hospital.

4.1.7 Give details of the Common Facilities available on the campus –spaces for special units like IQAC, Grievance Redressal unit, Women's Cell, Counselling and Career Guidance, Placement Unit, Health Centre, Canteen, recreational spaces for staff and students, safe drinking water facility, auditorium, etc.

College always focus on quality education, and to maintain this, it has initiated various agendas and implemented them earnestly. The details on common facilities is as follows:

IQAC: The IQAC has a well-furnished office with internet-connected computer, and it is spacious for meetings and academic planning. To finalize the various works like AQAR, maintenance of quality, reports; proper facilities like stationary, printer and whiteboard is available with this office.

Grievance and Redressal Unit: Grievance and Redressal Unit works through committee members assigned to it. The Department of Home Science and Office of the Principal deals with grievance cases, if occurs. College properly maintains the records in the computer, which is installed in the Department of Home Science.

Women's cell: Being a women college it try to guarantee of freedom of expression, freedom of learning and freedom of discussion. To enhance learning and development skills, college has opted various facilities to facilitate the women cell. The computer and ICT are used to manage the proposals, implementation of planning women's cell.

Counselling and Career Guidance: Counselling and career guidance is managed by this college through a committee, and all the information related to counselling or career guidance are displayed to the notice for the students, especially PG scholars, who wish to join various course work or jobs.

Placement Unit: College does not have placement unit, however, the career guidance cell in the college play an effective role for placements.

Health Center: The health center facility is available in the college especially for first aid, nonetheless, the emergency is managed by the off campus service, especially by the district hospital.

Canteen: We have a properly managed canteen in the college campus. An area/room for the canteen services is made accessible to the canteen personal. The inexpensive and nutritious edible items could be purchased from the canteen.

Recreational Space: The recreational space is maintained by the college administration and the committee concern. The MOS of the college and staff room is enabled with modern equipment for the refreshment of faculty and staff.

Safe Drinking Water: The Reverse Osmosis (RO) unit for clean drinking water has been installed in the college for faculty, staff and students. A cold-water machine is accessible to the students for safe and hygienic drinking use of water during summer.

Auditorium: Our institution have one auditorium with all the necessary equipment and facility maintained in it. The speaker, projector, screen and audio-visual technology is present in the auditorium for seminar, cultural, and departmental council related academic activities.

Yes, the library has advisory committee headed by the Principal of this college including librarian, senior faculty members and office staff. The composition of advisory committee also includes UG and PG students, and their suggestions are cherished and implemented by the purchase committee for library. This advisory committee recommends magazines, reference, textbook, journals, periodicals, online sources for the central and PG library for quality maintenance of learning in the college.

The purchase committee for the library of this college is accountable for the purchase of new books (reference and general textbook), magazines, journals, online sources, and newspapers. In the last four years (2012-2016), many books for the PG programs has been purchased, and online sources were procured for quality education and for the access to the faculty and staff.

So the special facilities for them is not sanctioned by the college, nonetheless, in future if any students wishes for her admission in college, our institution is ready to provide all the facilities required for such students/ scholars.

Yes, we get feedback annually from its users. All the feedback is analyzed by the library services committee and by the librarian altogether. In the mid of every academic session we distribute the feedback proforma and after two months, we ask students to submit it to the IQAC coordinator. The IQAC coordinator and Principal of this college send all the filled feedback to the library committee for analysis.

The improvement of library services, demand of books, online contents and computer facilities are analyzed properly from the student perspectives, and college ensure that all the required facilities made available to the students from the next/ new academic session.

Twenty-three (25) Computers are installed in the college in various departments including in the Principal's office and office of attendant. Additionally, three (03) laptops/notebooks are available in the college for faculty to work out various co-curricular activities.

College willing to purchase new computer, hotspots, printer and scanner for daily use in office and departments. In the coming years, college would upgrade its services for fee collection, scholarship management, and IT in library including PG for quality management in the academic areas.

4.3.5 How does the institution facilitate extensive use of ICT resources including development and use of computer-aided teaching/ learning materials by its staff and students?

Our college ensure the enhanced and developed use of ICT resources for the delivery of academic excellence. The students of this college accurately utilize the ICT infrastructure available to them for their course work and co-curricular activities. The use of teaching-learning materials by the students and faculty is based on computer allied ICT, is encouraged and the same is monitored by the head of this institution and IQAC together. The PPT presentation by the faculty and students is a normal process of teaching and learning of this college. Moreover, the computer lab within the college building (Department of Physics) is accessible by the students to increase their knowledge base in the ICT and use for study. All the laboratories are fully ICT enabled for quality education in the college.

4.3.6 Elaborate giving suitable examples on how the learning activities and technologies deployed (access to on-line teaching - learning resources, independent learning, ICT enabled classrooms/learning spaces etc.) by the institution place the student at the center of teaching-learning process and render the role of a facilitator for the teacher.

College always inspire its faculty to use the ICT tools for delivering the lectures in the classrooms. Students easily understand the PPT presentation used by the faculty on the topic, which is not much clearer and could not possible merely by lecture.

For example, Department of Political Science has used the PPT to focus on the

'Democratic Patterns in the World', which was easy by the UG students to grasp the basic outline of content. The Department of Botany, Zoology, Mathematics, Physics, Chemistry and Commerce often utilizes the IT equipped tools for delivering the knowledge to their scholars.

This college always prefers the quality education (teaching and learning) and faculties of this college provide space to their students to learn better. The ICT helps them to get most advance way of learning. The internet facility in the college is available for the students, the use of online searches for e-journals (either Hindi or English) helps them to get broader aspects of learning and faculties helps them to manage in between classroom lecture through PPT and online resources of the course content.

No, institution does not avail the National Knowledge Network Connectivity directly through the affiliating university.

4.4.2 What are the institutional mechanisms for maintenance and upkeep of the infrastructure, facilities and equipment of the college?

The maintenance of the infrastructure is important for the college; the repairing, security (by cameras installed), and yearly scrutiny is done quality control and the proper utilization of allocated budget for quality enhancement is the main aim of this college. Various committees, including IQAC, make sure that the maintenance, upgradation, and new purchase of the equipment is qualitative and could produce best output. The escalation of the infrastructure is important for the teaching and learning.

College always take decisions for better infrastructural facilities should be available to the scholar.

The head of the institution often sends the proposals to the Directorate of Higher Education for budget allocation.

4.4.3 How and with what frequency does the institute take up calibration and other precision measures for the equipment/ instruments?

College in its meetings (with IQAC and Head of Departments) bimonthly decides to upgrade, procurement the new equipment, which is obligatory for the laboratories of Science and Home Science for calibration. The committee always prefers the quality and the utilization of the allocated budget is consumed in the same manner.

4.4.4 What are the major steps taken for location, upkeep and maintenance of sensitive equipment (voltage fluctuations, constant supply of water etc.)?

The sensitive equipment like water motor, UPS, Inverters, Stabilizers, Generator, and other machine is thoroughly checked by the technician/ engineer for safety and uninterrupted service half yearly. Such electrical equipment is installed/ connected/ kept at the secure location within the college premises, so that they run perfectly and could not engender the hazard to the students, faculty and staff. A sign (danger sign) has been marked to the location of those electric tools, so that the person, who are unaware of such sensitive electrical equipment, should keep himself or herself safe.

The budget allocation under the head, RUSA has been utilized in the construction of separate PG building with three rooms. This construction is helpful in increasing the more classrooms, which was desired since 2007, when the PG programs were started.

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5.1 Student Mentoring and Support

Yes, college before the beginning of each academic session publish its prospectus/ handbook for admission seekers with all the required details. The introduction of the college, course and programs details, fee structure, library services, faculty details etc. are published in the prospectus. A form is also attached with the prospectus to submit it after filling the application correctly at the office for admission.

The scanned prospectus and form is available on the website during the admission process especially in July, annually. The prospectus contains all the essential information for the students those wish to join Ramabai Government Women PG College. The criteria for admission and rule related to it is provided in the prospectus as well. The mission and vision of this college is mentioned in the prospectus to attract newer/ fresh students for admission.

5.1.2 Specify the type, number and amount of institutional scholarships / freeships given to the students during the last four years and whether the financial aid was available and disbursed on time?

College does not offer any scholarship, except the financial assistance to the needy students. The scholarship annually provided by the Department of Social Welfare, Minority and Backward Class, Government of Uttar Pradesh to all the students those enrolled in UG and PG of Arts/ Social Sciences, Science and Commerce. The entire admitted student in every academic session are provided the scholarship from the Government of UP. The type and number of scholarship is mentioned below:

Beside this scholarship, college support ten needy students with financial aid annually from the boys fund maintained.

5.1.3 What percentage of students receive financial assistance from state government, central government and other national agencies?

Approximately 90 percent of enrolled in each academic year, get scholarship including fee reimbursement from Government of Uttar Pradesh. There are few students get INSPIRE science fellowship/award annually.

5.1.4 What are the specific support services/facilities available for

• Students from SC/ST, OBC and economically weaker sections

State government provides scholarship (including fee reimbursement) to the students from SC, ST, OBC and economically weaker sections. College also financially support ten needy students with little amount from the fund generated by the college (fund for poor students) itself.

• Students with physical disabilities

Beside infrastructural facilities, college support financially to such students those are physically disabled (*divyang*). Their fee is waived and they get the State Government scholarship as well.

College support all the students who participates in various competitions at National and International level. College provides financial support to such student, they get support from affiliated university and by the government to participate in different competitions.

• Medical assistance to students: health center, health insurance etc.

The basic medical facilities are available at college in the Department of Home Science, however during excess emergency the patient from this college is referred to district hospital. College does not have health center facility for students, faculty and staff.

There is no provision for health insurance at the college for students.

• Organizing coaching classes for competitive exams

College has proposed for the coaching classes for competitive exams and a letter/ proposal sent to the Directorate of Higher Education, Uttar Pradesh for such facility for needy students.

Skill development (spoken English, computer literacy, etc.,)

The spoken English classes in free time is managed by the Department of English and Political Science together. Faculty from these departments help students to enhance their speaking English skill.

The computer classes for students is held twice in a month in the laboratory of Physics department. Students from all the streams take interest and learn basic computer knowledge and internet use.

Support for "slow learners"

Remedial and extra special classes are arranged for 'slow learners' to improve their learning capacity. The students from 'advance learners' group help such deprived students to develop their knowledge base. A committee comprised of faculty members organize the plans for slow learners and implement effectively to help them accurately.

• Exposures of students to other institution of higher learning/ corporate/business house etc.

Students are provided opportunities to interact with other institute of higher learning, corporate and business houses/ organizations. Students across the programs/ course work are given chance to interact and discuss their queries to the guest faculty when arrived to this institution.

Publication of student magazines

College publish students magazine annually. The '*Pahal*' is ready to be published soon and would be in available before starting of next academic session in 2017-2018 in July 2017. Students do write and contribute their opinion through articles, poems and stories. Faculty encourages to the all students to contribute in the magazine publish by college.

5.1.5 Describe the efforts made by the institution to facilitate entrepreneurial skills, among the students and the impact of the efforts.

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Our institution adopts various procedures for the students to develop their entrepreneurial skills:

- 1. Student approaches to the nearby industries and manufacturing units to learn the management skills.
- 2. Counselling programs and workshops are organized for the students to develop their understandings about the entrepreneurships.

These efforts have impacted on the students positively, they learned the advance management system beyond syllabus and curriculum. This has provided the pragmatic methods of learning and developed the skills by students associating themselves at the industrial management.

Sports and Games: The department of Physical Education carry out all the curriculums related to sports. Students from UG and PG programs, participates in the sport, which is helpful for their health, mind and fitness.

Quiz Competitions: The quiz competitions are organized at the college level and at the departmental level as well. Students from various departments participates in intra and interdepartmental competitive activities. The winner of the competitions is honored during the annual function ceremony.

Debate and Discussion: College organize debate and discussion programs for the students to learn and gain knowledge more on concerned topic. Their participation in the programs intensify their self-confidence and the approach of cognitive learning.

Cultural Activities: College organize cultural activities bimonthly and students participates in the programs ardently. The Department of Home Science organizes the cultural programs at the college level. Our students usually perform the musical programs nearby places, when invited. A program in 2012 was organized in the NTPC, Tanda, Ambedkar Nagar, where our student performance was acclaimed guests.

additional academic support, flexibility in examinations

The college, if required financially and academically, supports the scholar who participates in extracurricular and co-curricular activities. They are asked to return their books late in the library. There is no flexibility during the

examinations for any students who participates in the extracurricular and cocurricular activities.

special dietary requirements, sports uniform and materials

The students who take participation in the extracurricular and co-curricular activities are cared by the concerned committee; and during the sports/ game activities the fruits, juice, Glucose and nutrient food are made available to them. The sport uniforms are distributed during the sport events in and outside the college campus. The shoes for running event are provided to competitors for their better performance in the college and outside the college.

The success rate is higher in state services rather than other professional competitions.

Our students have joined in basic teaching and intermediate teaching as government employee. The number of privately joined students are higher in teaching, in the past four years more than hundred students have secured their services through their ability and capacity.

College provides proper counseling services to its scholars for study, competition, personality and achievements.

Academic: Students get counselling for academic performance, awareness in the field of further studies and research.

Personal: The counsel for subjective development and personality are provided by the college and career counselling committee of this college take initiatives in this regards. **Career:** The career counselling committee organize workshops, talks and meetings with the students for their career and completive success. Numerous students got benefit from this committee and achieved their objectives.

Psychosocial: Students get psychological and social support from the college during their course work. The best advice for the competitive success is accessible by the students from the career counselling committee of this college. The students from backward, minority and marginalized sections get special care psychologically and socially. They get proper assistance through counselling for the academic and professional development.

Yes, the college have a structured mechanism for the career guidance. The career counselling committee renewed and constituted every year for focused career advice and counselling. College have no placement cell for placement services, nonetheless, the advice for professional achievements help the scholars to get their objectives and success.

Yes, the institution have Grievance Redressal Cell for grievance and solution to it. In the last four years (2102-2016) no complaint has been received, except the advice cum complaint of requirement of Vehicle/ Bus service for the students those who are coming from exterior places. A complaint box is installed at the administrative bloc for grievance redressal supervision.

5.1.11 What are the institutional provisions for resolving issues pertaining to sexual harassment?

This institute have a committee for ensuring gender justice and prohibiting sexual harassment at work place. **No** case was registered for sexual harassment in the last twelve years. Being a women college, the institute take special care for gender sensitization and regularly hold meetings between scholars, staff and faculties for gender impartiality. Committee in its regular quarterly meetings, discuss the issue of gender equality and propagate it in the college. Moreover, college follows the Government of India, Government of Uttar Pradesh and Supreme Court of India guidelines for securing the rights of women through gender sensitization.

Yes, the college have Anti-Ragging Committee to stop any kind of ragging at this college. Nonetheless, not a single case of ragging has been registered/ reported since the college is established in 1997. Furthermore, the students from senior batches frequently cooperate with junior/ new students.

Numerous welfare schemes are available at the college. The financial assistance to poor students, book donation to poor and marginalized sections, fee reimbursement from Government of Uttar Pradesh, stationary and essential print outs to needy students, free health checkups and sport kit for poor athletes is made available to student under the welfare policy of this Ramabai Government Mahila PG College.




Chart 2: STUDENT PROGRESSION

5.2.3 How does the institution facilitate student progression to higher level of education and/or towards employment?

College provide proper guidance and psychological support to its student for progression in the other courses/ programs higher than available within the campus. Students are advised to opt for entrance examination for other universities/ colleges to join various other programs. In the year 2013, a student of this college, Ms. Durgawati Patel was got admission in MA (Sociology) in Jawaharlal Nehru University, New Delhi and many other students have qualified entrance examination for University of Allahabad for PG course; few have joined University of Lucknow for PhD programs in JRF (UGC) and NET (UGC) category in 2013-2016. As far as the employment is concern, the career guidance cell of this college support the student for professional achievements. Several students have get selected in government and privately managed services and performing better in their field/ service area.

5.2.4 Enumerate the special support provided to students who are at risk of failure and drop out?

The remedial classes including extra care from welfare committees are prearranged for the students whose performance is not much considerable. College ensure to reduce the dropout rates, nonetheless, the percentage is much less and under control which occurs especially at UG level in science and commerce.

5.3 Student Participation and Activities

5.3.1 List the range of sports, games, cultural and other extracurricular activities available to students. Provide details of participation and program calendar.

There are several extracurricular organized by the college and participation of students are appreciable. During the sport events like half-yearly and annual sports competition, the student participates in various game events.

The college organizes the Race, Discus, Shotput, Javelin, Carom, Chess, Table Tennis, *Kabaddi*, Tug of war, Slow Cycle, Football and badminton regularly. In the cultural activities, like dance, singing, drama, *rangoli* competition and mehndi design, the student participation from UG and PG is much adequate. 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The programs for extracurricular activities begins in mid-academic session every year; and sport, cultural and extracurricular activities are organized as per academic calendar, nevertheless, the schedule of the programs might change due to other curricular and co-curricular activities.

Students from this college have achieved championship in sport events, cultural activities and debate competitions. The details have been included in appendices after the last section of this report.

Sport: College has sent teams for intercollegiate, university, state and national level sport events i.e. race, handball, badminton etc. Our students at state and national level of sport events have won numerous prize. In the last four years, 20 Gold, 35 Silver and 72 Bronze medals were won by our students in different collective and individual sport events at the intercollegiate/ university and state, national level. The college sport team in the direction of Dr. Rajesh Kumar, Assistant Professor of Physical Education, has received more than 10 Shields.

Cultural: College has sent students to perform in various cultural events. Students of this college not only received the prize; nonetheless, the positions were secured several times in singing, dance, drama and solo performances at local and state level.

Debate: Many students from this college has participated in the debates, organized by various other institutes in the districts. Students from Department of Political Science have secured first and second position and received the prize, certificates and acclamation from the organizers outside the college campus.

College get feedback from students to improve the quality requirements in academic and infrastructure areas. The books, ICT facility, laboratory equipment and computer are maintained based on feedback received by the IQAC of this college.

Students are advised to publish their scholarly works in the college magazine '*Pahal*', and they contribute through wall magazines, posters as well. In the year 2012-13, the college magazine '*Manogya*' was published; and due to the non-budgetary allocation from the authority, college could not able to publish the magazines for the other consecutive sessions. Nonetheless, the wall magazine and posters were displayed and published by our students quarterly in all the academic sessions from 2012 to 2016.

The collection of scholarly writings were published in '*Manogya*', in 2012 and few catalogues were displayed continuously from 2012-16, which shows the quality concern of the college and aptitude of our scholars.

Yes, every department have council comprised of scholar representatives elected through direct voting and supports from fellow students. Moreover, the responsibility of faculties and staff members to contribute honestly is imperative to us.

6.1.2 What is the role of top management, Principal and Faculty in design and implementation of its quality policy and plans?

The role of top management or authorities i.e. Directorate of Higher Education and Government of Uttar Pradesh, Principal, Faculty are important for planning and quality.

Directorate: It implement the government policies on Higher Education and directs the college authority for development of educational quality. It distributes the budget for salary, development, equipment, library and maintenance. It creates and fills all the vacant post from Group C and D in all the Government Degree Colleges. Directorate can audit the financial activities of the college and Finance Controller (FC) is appointed at the directorate for the budgetary and its associated activities.

Government of Uttar Pradesh: The Department of Higher Education formulate the rule and regulation, fills the post of faculties / officer (Group A) after the recommendations from Public Service Commission of Uttar Pradesh (UPPSC), and approved by state Governor. It sanctions the budget for college development, infrastructure and salary as well. The government follows the UGC guidelines for quality enhancement in the higher education.

Principal: The Principal of the college is the head of the institute, who administer and implements the policies. He/she is the Drawing and Disbursing Officer (DDO) of the college and recommends salary for faculty and staff. The Principal is the main authority in the college, who manages all the academic and non-academic activities. He/she can guide and inspire the faculty, students and staff for the progress of academic atmosphere in the college. He/she leads all the programs organized in the college, and finalizes the academic endeavors and planning.

Faculty: Faculty in the main unit of the college, being a teacher he/she teach students and finalizes the curriculum. The classroom lecture, curricular and extracurricular activities are guided by the faculty to his/her students. The faculty manages all the academic environment of the college. The committee for various academic activities is comprised of mainly faculties of this college. The faculty plays a vital role in monitoring the course design, supervising the student, motivating them, spanning the gap between students and Principal.

The leadership of the college is with the Principal, who plays an important role in finalizing the mission and objectives. He/she decides the plan for ensuring the delivery of quality education to the admitted students. Regular review meetings, interaction with students and academic audit is perform by the Principal. His/her advise in the committee meeting is taken care by all the members and planning are reflected in the academic output.

The Principal of this college monitors all the academic and nonacademic functions. The action plans for academic quality is main intentions, which are incorporated under the supervision of Principal. He/she directs the faculty members and staff for new changes, which are necessary for the college in academic attainments.

Interaction with stakeholders

Principal is the main authority who interact with college/institution's stakeholders. He/she invite and arrange teacher-parent meetings, alumni meet and entrepreneur for student consultations.

• Proper support for policy and planning through need analysis, research inputs and consultations with the stakeholders

Principal support the all committee activities in managing the meetings with stakeholders. He/she could suggest the ideas to the all Head of Departments, which is necessary for the college educational growth. The ideas or suggestions from the stakeholders are analyzed thoroughly and the Principal plans on the basis of analytical output and guarantee the preferred implementation in the interest of college and student.

• Reinforcing the culture of excellence

Principal with his/her team (faculty, students and staff) try to implement all the required policy and plan for better academic setup in the college. The culture of excellence in this college is depend on the leadership of administration, and the Principal of this college focus on the value oriented infrastructure and education for students.

Champion of organizational change

Principal is the champion of the organizational change. He/she observe

and analyze the problem and tries to solve them through best practices in academic and non-academic areas in the college. He /she heads the IQAC meetings, and directs the coordinator and members to involve the new changes in the academics. For instance, during the NAAC first cycle, Principal and coordinator managed and improved the excellence of college in academic and infrastructural setup, and a good grade was apportioned by the NAAC.

The college is depended on the important decisions and directions of the Principal for its proper functioning. He/she is only main authority for managing the college. The faculty and staff always get directions in all the academic processes, which is necessary for the organizational academic welfare.

6.2.2 Does the Institute have a perspective plan for development? If so, give the aspects considered for inclusion in the plan.

Yes, this institute have a perspective plan for development. The aspects are:

- To maintain the academic quality, the involvement of faculty and students is made compulsory in the curriculum structure, while sending suggestion to the affiliated university.
- The faculty are encouraged for their own speculative development through training programs, which helps the institution to get up-to-date knowledge and skill pattern, which are necessary for the college in the phase excessive quality demand.
- The students are advised for their academic growth both ideally and professionally, and this approach is important for them to perform better in the wriggled situation
- The development is not possible without feasible ideas, the freedom of thought and teaching learning helps the faculty and student to improve their approach.

6.2.3 Describe the internal organizational structure and decision making processes.

The internal organizational play imperious role in the decision making process and the college committee works immaculately for captivating the decisions, which involved all the representatives of council of students, faculty and staff for effective functioning of academic expansion through academic and non-academic frameworks. The IQAC is the most significant committee to develop the goal for educational standard and planning for its accomplishment. Principal of the college monitor the outcomes of the activities of the working group and decides the major policy initiatives at the college.

6.2.4 Give a broad description of the quality improvement strategies of the institution for each of the following

Teaching & Learning

Teaching and learning are scrutinized through inputs from student, stakeholders, and faculty. The output from feedback is implemented in the curriculum and co-curricular activities. The IQAC along with Principal of this college decides the quality criteria in every academic session and focus on growth of academic state of affairs.

Research & Development

College does not offer research activities. Nonetheless, the faculty improves the rational of the scholars through lectures and encouragement of students during the course work. The research ideas are engendered among the scholars for maximum efficiency to serve the society and nation.

Community engagement

The extension activities (through NSS, Ranger, YRC) are carried out by our scholars for community engagement through literacy, health and sanitation, women empowerment and environment concerns.

Human resource management

College effectively manage the human resource available to it. The training programs for faculty and the guidance to staff is available in the college with the help of workshop and symposia, beside Orientation and Refresher program. The Department of Higher Education of Uttar Pradesh, encourage its Faculty, Staff and Principal for dedication in delivering the responsibility.

Industry interaction

College ensure the development of entrepreneurship and learning management skills through industry interaction. Selected students are sent to nearby/ local industries to learn the management and systemic working culture.

6.2.5 How does the Head of the institution ensure that adequate information (from feedback and personal contacts etc.) is available for the top management and the stakeholders, to review the activities of the institution?

The head of the institution sent the all suggestions and quality issues to the Directorate of Higher Education, Allahabad for information. Suggestions/ feedback information also discussed among its stakeholders to review the activities of this institution.

6.2.6 How does the management encourage and support involvement of the staff in improving the effectiveness and efficiency of the institutional processes?

Regular meetings with the staff for improving efficiency of the institutional process is held and the suggestions are implemented properly in the college. All the staffs are encouraged to perform better; their grievances are listened and solved by the head of the institution and committee involved.

6.2.7 Enumerate the resolutions made by the Management Council in the last year and the status of implementation of such resolutions.

College is a Government Women PG College and the Principal is the head of the institution, who manage all the academic and administrative activities. In the last year 2014-2015, several resolutions were made:

- Improved library facilities
- Improved sport ground
- PG Building
- Regular student-faculty meeting under the supervision of head of this institute
- More environment friendly campus

These resolutions/ commitments are completed in the academic session 2015-16, and reviewed by the new Principal Prof. Shefali Singh and the coordinator Dr. Mahendra Prakash and members of the IQAC.

6.2.8 Does the affiliating university make a provision for according the status of autonomy to an affiliated institution? If 'yes', what are the efforts made by the institution in obtaining autonomy?

This institution is not an autonomous higher educational institute; even so, being a government managed college, it is free from any restrictions for improvement of academic quality except course work/ curriculum and examination from the affiliated university. Government of Uttar Pradesh manages the college for salary, infrastructure, academic development, posting, transfer, promotion of the faculty and staff etc.

6.2.9 How does the Institution ensure that grievances / complaints are promptly attended to and resolved effectively? Is there a mechanism to analyze the nature of grievances for promoting better stakeholder relationship?

The Grievance and Redressal Committee is responsible for the solution of the problems appear at the college. All the grievances are redressed by the committee headed by the Principal of this college, to ensure that complains are resolved quickly and effectively. The nature of complains are well analyzed and grouped for speedy justice to the complainant. Being a college for women scholars, the grievances are mostly monitored by the female faculty members to ensure the gender justice. The complains from male staff are resolved by the committee coordinator and the Principal of this college.

6.2.10 During the last four years, had there been any instances of court cases filed by and against the institute? Provide details on the issues and decisions of the courts on these?

No, there not any case filed by the institute or against it.

Yes, the IQAC committee of this college properly analyze the student feedback to ensure the institutional performance regarding provision of the academic reputation.

6.3 Faculty Empowerment Strategies

6.3.1 What are the efforts made by the institution to enhance the professional development of its teaching and non-teaching staff?

There are numerous ways for the professional development of faculty and staff members. These includes:

- The workshop, symposium and talks for the professional development of its faculty and non-teaching staff.
- All the teaching members get the support from the head of this institute for their professional training at Human Resource Development Center (HRDC) of the UGC.
- Staff members are sent to training programs for the enhancement of efficiency and capability.
- The skill-oriented programs for ICT is available in the college for Teaching and Non-teaching staff.

6.3.2 What are the strategies adopted by the institution for faculty empowerment through training, retraining and motivating the employees for the roles and responsibility they perform?

All the faculty members are advised by the Principal to be trained in specialized programs conducted by the UGC/ CSIR or other professional bodies. The Department of Higher Education, Uttar Pradesh manage the training programs for faculty and staff as well. At the college level, the training programs are conducted in the form of symposia, workshop and seminar based on IT to improve the teaching capacity through quality concerns. The IQAC outline the programs associated to the training for faculty depend on the requirements of the curriculum.

6.3.3 Provide details on the performance appraisal system of the staff to evaluate and ensure that information on multiple activities is appropriately captured and considered for better appraisal.

The faculty filled their performance based appraisal system (PBAS) proforma as instructed by the UGC under the Career Advancement Scheme (CAS) for promotion in different stages and pay band. Moreover, the Annual Confidential Report (ACR) filled by the faculty is graded by the Principal being the immediate officer of the faculty to evaluate their academic and nonacademic performance in addition. The ACR of the faculties are sent to the Directorate for further action.

The performance appraisal system for the staff members to evaluate their activities done through ACR. The Principal is responsible and authority to evaluate the activities of staff and grade them accordingly.

6.3.4 What is the outcome of the review of the performance appraisal reports by the management and the major decisions taken? How are they communicated to the appropriate stakeholders?

The performance-based appraisal is confidential, however Principal of the

college based on evaluation and grading, suggests to the faculty and staff for improvement in their performance in academic and non-academic activities. The perfection for the skill-based capacity is discussed with the faculty and staff by the head of the institution for better output.

Nonetheless, the Academic Performance Indicator (API) for PBAS (UGC) for the faculty is filled in detail related to academic; co-curricular, extension and professional development activities; and the IQAC analyze the proforma, and suggest the faculty for additional improvement.

6.3.5 What are the welfare schemes available for teaching and non-teaching staff? What percentage of staff have availed the benefit of such schemes in the last four years?

Various welfare schemes have been implemented for teaching and nonteaching staff by the Department of Higher Education, Uttar Pradesh. All the government facilities are available for the employee beside rules and regulations of the UGC. Travel grant, duty leave, training programs, loan from PF, medical leave, maternity leave and childcare leave is available for faculty and staff members.

Twenty three percent (23%) of the faculty and staff members have availed the welfare schemes in the last four years (2012-16) available for them.

6.3.6 What are the measures taken by the Institution for attracting and retaining eminent faculty?

There are no such steps taken for attracting and retaining the eminent faculty members due to fully government managed college. After retirement, no faculty was provided chance to work again in the organization.

The Department of Higher Education, Government of Uttar Pradesh has not approved any rule for the re-appointment of retired faculties.

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1 What is the institutional mechanism to monitor effective and efficient use of available financial resources?

The financial assistance is accessible to college by the DHEUP and directorate, Allahabad for purchasing, infrastructure and maintenance. Principal is the main authority to sanction the amount to firms; those supply the apparatus, and do construction work and maintain services on contract.

The committee in the college is responsible for the major suggestions provide to the Principal, and the tender is published in the newspaper at regional level. In the year 2014-15, Rs. 2600 has been collected from auction as well. Principal checks the quotation accurately before approving any financial activities. This ensure the best utilization of financial resources for the development of college.

6.4.2 What are the institutional mechanisms for internal and external audit?

When was the last audit done and what are the major audit objections? Provide the details on compliance.

The financial sanctions for purchase, construction, developing infrastructure is auditable by the finance department to check any misuse of the allocated funds, accounts and records in the college. Principle being DDO of the college could inspect the financial records available in the office. The external audit is done by the government agency, finance department, and the official usually arrives in February-March every year.

The objections and suggestions are taken into considerations for proper use of taxpayer's money/ government finance for development of college, salary etc.

6.4.3 What are the major sources of institutional receipts/funding and how is the deficit managed? Provide audited income and expenditure statement of academic and administrative activities of the previous four years and the reserve fund/corpus available with Institutions, if any.

The major source of institutional funding is from the Government of Uttar Pradesh, the government sanctions all the financial requirements for this college. The fee and other sources are managed by the college level, nonetheless the collection of funds and utilization related records are sent to the Directorate for information. The deficit situation never occurs in the government-managed higher educational institutes.

6.5 Internal Quality Assurance System (IQAS)

6.5.1 Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC)

Yes, our institution established the IQAC in the year 2010. The IQAC in the college is the prominent committee to manage and maintain the academic quality. The Principal, coordinator and members of the IQAC, monitors the course content, curriculum, co-curricular, ECA, extension activities and maintenance of infrastructure together. College maintains the academic quality with the help of teaching and learning progressions. IQAC continuously monitors the functions of various committees and the academic excellence of the institution is assessed on the performance of students.

The IQAC continuously played an important role in institutionalizing the quality assurance in global competitive age. The IQAC team along with head of the institution discusses the feedback and the outcome is prompted for the quality delivery of higher education to the scholars.

b. How many decisions of the IQAC have been approved by the management /authorities for implementation and how many of them were actually implemented?

The college has approved/ executed numerous decisions of the IQAC:

- The substructure for PG building (RUSA sanctioned) is in progress
- The basic facilities like Wi-Fi, LAN, and Hotspot (ICT utilization) has been encouraged
- Student participation in various committees has been doubled since 2010
- Environment protection activities and related plan is implemented systematically to make more effective environment friendly campus
- The IT equipment was purchased and installed at the required place
- The PG library was established in 2011-12
- The A/MOS was planned in 2012-13 and implemented in 2016
- PPT/ ICT use has been encouraged for classroom discourse
- New methods for teaching and learning is adopted by the faculty and students instantaneously, the use of white boards is in practice now
- Water harvesting was initiated in 2012-13
- Safe drinking water facility was made more operative since 2011-12

- Library automation/ cataloging was discussed in 2010, and the same is implemented in 2016-17, time extended
- The PBAS under CAS of the UGC (regulations, 2010) was implemented in 2014 for advancement in Stage/ pay band/ Academic Grade Pay (AGP) of the faculties
- The AQAR was sent to NAAC, Bangalore
- The sport ground was effectively maintained in 2014
- The maintenance of college i.e. whitewash, painting, polishing and cleanness is completed in 2014
- The frequency of Debate, Discussion, Seminar, Talks, Symposia, guest lectures, lecture series, MCQ, essay writings, poster design, cultural activities has been increased in comparison to previous years
- The proper record of the documents has materialized and Management Information System (MIS) is at proper place
- One more botanical garden was established, Home Science and Science labs are enriched
- Student cycle parking was renovated in 2015-16
- Proposal for open new courses/ programs was sent
- Research program proposal was sent 2015-16 for research work
- Frequency of students-faculty meetings has been increased
- The extensive and operative role of extension activities, cocurricular and ECA was materialized

c. Does the IQAC have external members on its committee? If so, mention any significant contribution made by them.

Yes, the institution perform Academic Audit itself for quality maintenance of this educational institute for academic provisions. The IQAC is significant for the college to ensure quality, however the external quality assurance agency, i.e. the team from Department of Higher Education, Government of Uttar Pradesh, often visit to the college and after scrutiny, the team suggest diverse points on various aspect, which is relevant for the quality assurance of this college.

The Principal and IQAC of this college continuously review the teachingleaning process. Coordinator, Chairperson and members of the IQAC is composed of learned and skilled professor, which include senior faculties, office personnel, students and external members as well.

The IQAC get various suggestions from stakeholders through feedback and regular meetings between faculty, student, parents, office staff, external members and eminent educational personalities.

The outcome of quality assurance is important for college, it properly implement all the propositions provided by different stakeholders. Curriculum design, ECA, ICT enabled lectures, use of information technology (IT) and extension activities are the main points on which college get advice to improve the quality and focus on these concerns.




Chart 3: THE STRUCTURE OF THE IQAC

Energy conservation

The proposal for installation of solar lights has been sent to Municipality of Akbarpur, Ambedkar Nagar and NTPC, Tanda. The old bulbs and tube lights has been replaced with LED in Auditorium/ Conference, office and in class rooms for energy conservation.

Use of renewable energy

Solar power fitted lamps would be available soon in the college premises.

Water harvesting

College uses the water harvesting process for watering plants, conserving water to increase water level in addition.

Check dam construction

Efforts for Carbon neutrality

Use of environment friendly vehicle has been encouraged. Students often use bicycle to attend the classes, which shows their awareness for protecting the environment.

Plantation

College plant trees in every academic session on *Van Mahotsav* of Government of Uttar Pradesh and on National Holidays. Two

botanical gardens has been created in the college premises to save the endangered plant species and preserve verities. The NSS and student volunteer plant the trees in the available area in the campus, and aware the common masses additionally.

Hazardous waste management

Yes, college is having proper waste management facilities for Hazardous waste.

e-waste management

College dump all the e-waste i.e. old electric equipment, printer inkbottle, electric lights properly. An awareness campaign and workshop is organized in college to assure that every scholars should understand the e-waste management.

7.2 Innovations

7.2.1 Give details of innovations introduced during the last four years, which have created a positive impact on the functioning of the college.

There are various innovative ideas were introduced in the last four years (2012-16):

- The library has been upgraded and the N-List facility was introduced in 2014-15.
- The construction of PG classrooms is under process, initiated in 2014-15.
- College initiated to deposit the fee through online or directly to Bank account to ensure cashless admission process.
- The CCTV for video surveillance was installed in 2014-15.
- Water harvesting has been introduced in 2013-14 for apposite use of natural resources.
- E-waste management introduced in 2012-13.

7.3 Best Practices

7.3.1 Elaborate on any two best practices in the given format at page no. 98, which have contributed to the achievement of the Institutional Objectives and/or contributed to the Quality improvement of the core activities of the college.

Being a Women PG College and fully managed by Government of Uttar Pradesh, it ensures the excellence in the academic field. College possess various best practices after its establishment in June 1997. Earlier college was in the rural located area, now the location has been demarcated, and college is included in the urban zone. The awareness campaigns by college at nearby localities, is the most significant contribution for the society as best practices.

The two best practices are:

I. Title: Social Awareness Campaigns

Goal: The major goal of social campaign is to eliminate the social problems and insalubrious practices from society and aware the commonalities for their rights, dignity, and suitable way of life.

The Context: India is a fast growing economy and in the coming years, it has been expected that in 2030, the Indian economy would cross the major economies of the world. Peoples of India are dreaming to be super power, which is possible, though there are constrains, that has to be exterminated properly. The society of India, especially the rural population faces lots of problem due to unawareness and untrained knowledge. This condition is not reasonable for developing India, which would be an economic leader in coming years. It is now the duty of young and educated person to participate in the campaign drive and generate awareness on various social and national issues, so that common masses could easily solve problems and be able to flourish their life.

The Practice: Our students often visit at adopted village nearby college to spread awareness on a number of social issues to fulfil the institutional social responsibility (ISR):

- Regular rally, *Nukkad Natak*, and talks on the issues concerning society i.e. women empowerment and liberty, gender sensitization, social justice, integrities, communal harmony, discourage corruption.
- Cleanness drive, digital literacy, organizing awareness for voter registration and voting, blood donation, first aid, save girl child and educate girl child, no to plastic bags, no to alcohol, no to domestic violence, tree plantations, sensitive towards climate change and global warming, awareness against AIDS etc. by both NSS and Ranger units.
- Poster design, slogan writing on walls and discussions on social issues during NSS seven days camp and one-day camps.
- Programs on national days in rural areas to aware people and motivate them on national integration.

• Regular monitoring of problems of students from disadvantaged sections of society and minorities by the equal opportunity cell.

Evidence of Success: In the last four years, our student participated in different social awareness campaigns and the positive results ensued. The registration for 'voters' has been increased; the villages nearby college become beautiful and clean, the cases of domestic violence is reduced, the enrolment of girls in the schools has been increased etc.

Problems Encountered and Resource Required: There was no problem encountered while managing the campaign drive on various social problems. College have enough resources for regular Ranger activities and the financial assistance from the affiliated university for NSS is adequate to carry out the social campaign against social iniquities.

II. Title: Academic and extracurricular Activities

Goal: College always wants to increase its educational excellence by managing diverse events in academic and extracurricular activities. To enhance the skill of learners is the major goal of this government managed higher educational institute. The academic opportunities especially to rural, weaker and socially backward students is important for this college to bring social justice in action. Students are encouraged to participate in extracurricular activities (ECA), for their future and developing the learning skills.

The Context: The higher education especially for girl/women scholars is essential in India. It is evident from the experience, that the women were denied the proper education facilities, learning, and realizing skills for professional and personal development. Women occupy half of the population in India and are important for human resource. However, for long, there have been a social biasness against women and by denying the socio-economic opportunity to them. The disregarding approach towards women is noticeable in many areas including education. India could not ignore the role of women in various developmental activities for long. Ramabai Government Mahila Post Graduate College was established in 1997 for accessing opportunities of higher education. The admitted women scholars are continuously engaged in getting knowledge and skill altogether.


